SPEAKERS



Erin Ahn, PhD

Dr. Erin Ahn is an Associate Professor in the Department of Pathology at the University of Alabama at Birmingham (UAB). She also serves as a Scientist and a Community Outreach & Engagement (COE) Liaison for the Neuro-Oncology Program at the UAB O'Neal Comprehensive Cancer Center. Dr. Ahn earned her B.S. and M.S. from Seoul National University in South Korea and her Ph.D. from UAB. She completed her postdoctoral training at the University of California San Diego, Moores Cancer Center.

Dr. Ahn's laboratory investigates the molecular mechanisms of gene expression associated with neurodevelopmental disorders and various cancers, including leukemia, glioblastoma, and breast cancer. Her current research particularly focuses on how abnormal RNA regulation leads to cancer progression, therapy resistance, and defective organ development, including brain malformations. Her research team was the first to identify ZTTK syndrome, a rare genetic disease affecting children's mental and physical development. Dr. Ahn is a founding member of the ZTTK SON-Shine Foundation, a patient support group, and actively educates families, clinicians, and researchers worldwide to promote rare disease awareness and research aimed at developing novel therapies for ZTTK syndrome.



Rebecca Arend, MD, MSPH

Rebecca Arend, MD, MSPH is Associate Professor of Gynecologic Oncology at UAB and an Associate Scientist at the UAB O'Neal Comprehensive Cancer Center Experimental Therapeutics Program. She completed her residency at Columbia Presbyterian in New York, NY and completed her fellowship at UAB. While a fellow at UAB, her review of the Wnt pathway in ovarian cancer became one of the 5 most cited papers in Gynecologic Oncology. Her current basic science pursuits include understanding the role of anti-tumor

immunity in ovarian cancer through Wnt modulation, metabolism, and epigenetics.

Dr. Arend's clinical interests include translational research, targeted therapy, chemoresistance, immunotherapy, and personalized medicine. Numerous Gyn Onc fellows, postdoctoral fellows, graduate students, residents, and medical students have trained under her direct mentorship. She has been awarded funding for over five Investigator Initiated trials and has served as both the local and national Principal Investigator on multiple Phase II and III clinical trials. She is the co-chair of UAB's Gyn and Personalized Medicine Disease Oriented Working Groups, the Chair of the CCC Data Safety Monitoring Committee, and the Chair of UAB Tissue Committee. She is also the Co-Translational Science Chair of NRG's Ovarian Committee.

Katie Barnes, MPA, CPC, FACHE



Katie has most recently served as the Vice President, Cancer service line at Virginia Commonwealth University. She led the cancer team to optimize clinic performance and engage stakeholders to quality optimization, resulting in 19% increased volume and doubling clinical trial accruals to over 200 patients where VCU Massey Cancer Center achieved Comprehensive cancer center designation January 2023 by the NCI. Additionally, she led the construction of a new outpatient cancer center & concurrent Epic

go-live in late 2021. Previously Katie served as the Administrator of The Ohio State University Wexner Center and James Cancer Hospital and Comprehensive Cancer Center where she worked to develop and grow the Oncology programs. Under her leadership, the Oncology program has gone through a culture change by developing a collaboration with the staff and helping to promote a culture of mutual respect and professionalism.

Prior to OSU, she worked for OhioHealth and had administrative oversight of system service lines of Anesthesia, Emergency Medicine, Hospital Medicine, Oncology, Orthopedics, Neurology/Neurosurgery, and pulmonology/critical care across thirteen hospitals.

Katie has an MPA from Indiana University and a Bachelor of Arts in Political Science from Georgia State University. She is a certified phlebotomist and certified physician coder. Dori Pekmezi, PhD

Dori Pekmezi is a Professor in the Department of Health Behavior, School of Public Health, University of Alabama at Birmingham, where she has worked as faculty since 2009. She received her Ph.D. in Clinical Psychology at Louisiana State University in 2007 and completed a postdoctoral research fellowship at Brown Medical School in 2009. Her research interests focus on theory- and technology- supported lifestyle interventions for cancer prevention and control in underserved/at risk populations.



Neil Pfister MD, PhD

Dr. Neil Pfister is a tenured-track assistant professor/physician scientist at the University of Alabama at Birmingham within the Department of Radiation Oncology. Clinically, I serve as the disease site leader for gastrointestinal and hepatopancreaticobiliary cancers. I also serve as backup clinical service for lung cancers and lymphomas. My lab studies cellular pathways at the intersection of oxidative stress and the DNA damage response (DDR). We found that the core ATP synthase subunit ATP5A1 is cleaved following high dose ionizing

radiation to release a bioactive protein (cleaved ATP5A1) that translocates from the mitochondria to the nucleus to promote an adaptive cellular program to facilitate DNA repair and cell survival. Cleaved ATP5A1 is a candidate radio sensitization target as functional blockade enhances ionizing radiation- induced cancer cell death. My laboratory is funded in part by an NIH/NCI K08 grant to study cleaved ATP5A1 (1K08CA252614-01A1), and we have also been funded by a DOD PRMRP award to utilize CRISPR/Cas9 genome-wide and genome-targeted screens to identify novel radio resistance and radio sensitizing genes. We are establishing a secondary project investigating isoforms of succinate dehydrogenase, which are differentially regulated in cancer. I also have a clinical and bioinformatics collaborations with the biotech company Numenos.AI, for which I serve on their advisory board.

Professionally, I am working to find, develop, and characterize genes that impact how cells respond to radiation therapy, and I plan to translate my basic research discoveries into clinical investigations combining targeted therapeutics with radiotherapy. My professional goals are to lead collaborative research teams to improve our understanding of cancer biology, render outstanding patient care to all people, and coordinate multidisciplinary efforts from a basic science focus to improve cancer treatment and outcomes. I am invigorated with thoughts of the advances in cancer treatment that will unfold over the coming decades, and I intend to be a significant contributor to these advances.



Demetria Pollard-Moore

Demetria Pollard-Moore is the creator of "Journey to Lose Fitness." The group was created eight years ago to help people understand that there's joy in fitness and to help them find their way to a healthier lifestyle and understand that their health is their wealth.
