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MEET THE SPEAKERS





Hope Amm, PhD is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery at the University of Alabama at Birmingham. She received her BS in Biological Sciences from Saint Mary's College and Ph.D. in Pharmacology and Toxicology from UAB with a focus on cancer biology and novel therapeutics. Dr. Amm completed the Dental Academic Research

Training (DART) program as a post-doctoral scholar in the laboratory of Dr. Mary MacDougall at the UAB School of Dentistry and was a Mentored Experiences in Research, Instruction, and Teaching (MERIT) program Scholar-at-Large, which provided teaching experiences at minority-partner institutions. She has collaborated on projects related to the genetic and molecular basis of craniofacial diseases, particularly odontogenic tumors. She has characterized numerous cellular models of odontogenic tumors and developed new in vivo models. Dr. Amm was awarded a NIDCR K99/R00 to support her early research endeavors focusing genetics and signaling pathways in oral tumors. Particularly those that play a role in the pathogenesis of human oral cancers and odontogenic tumors with a goal to develop therapies and diagnostic tools, with an emphasis on targeted therapies. She works closely with oral surgeons on projects to provide better diagnostics and surgical outcomes. Her work has been funded by the Department of Defense, the National Institute of Dental and Craniofacial Research, and the Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery Foundation.





Monica L. Baskin, PhD, is a Professor of Preventive Medicine at the University of Alabama at Birmingham (UAB) School of Medicine and Associate Director for Community Outreach & Engagement at the O'Neal Comprehensive Cancer Center at UAB. She received her Bachelor of Arts in psychology and sociology from Emory University, and a Master

of Science in community counseling and Ph.D. in counseling psychology from Georgia State University. She is a licensed psychologist whose research focuses on minority health and health disparities. Her research utilizes community-based participatory methods to better understand and address individual, family, and environmental factors associated with the prevention and control of chronic diseases such as cancer, diabetes and heart disease. Her research has largely focused on African American and rural communities in the Deep South. This work has been funded by the National Institutes of Health (NIH), Robert Wood Johnson Foundation (RWJF), and other regional and local foundations. Dr. Baskin is a trained and authorized facilitator of nationally-recognized training programs on unconscious bias for health professionals and equity, diversity, and inclusion (EDI). She is also the immediate past president of the Society of Behavioral Medicine (SBM).





Kristi proactively oversees the team's account planning processes and responsibilities for delivering the most effective and appropriate evidence-based strategies to advance cancer prevention, early detection and overall patient quality of life. Kristi began her career in a clinic setting as a Patient Care Technician in Children's of Alabama's operating room while obtaining her Health Care Management degree from the University of Alabama at Birmingham. After graduation, Kristi's passion for understanding and assessing a patient's barriers to care led her to join one of the largest urgent care facilities as the lead of an EMR implementation team training over 30 clinics across the nation.

Braden McFarland, PhD



Braden McFarland, Ph.D., Assistant Professor, obtained her Ph.D. in Neurobiology with a focus on Neuro-Oncology from the University of Alabama at Birmingham (UAB) in 2009. During her doctorate training, she pursued efforts in understanding the migration and invasion of glioblastoma (GBM) cells, and extensive training in anti-angiogenic

therapy. She then completed her postdoctoral fellowship studying aberrant protein signal transduction and tumor immunology in GBM at UAB under the mentorship of Dr. Etty (Tika) Benveniste. In 2015, she was promoted to Instructor in the Cell, Developmental, and Integrative Biology Department at UAB, and as of 2019 was promoted to Assistant Professor. She is also co-Director of the new Undergraduate Program in Cancer Biology. Her research interests are centered around discovering new therapies for patients with GBM, which include pharmacological inhibition of the JAK/STAT pathway in patient-derived xenograft models, exploiting inflammatory (anti-tumor) macrophages to enhance standard of care in immunocompetent models, and understanding how the gut microbiome is altered by the diet as well as by certain drug therapies in mouse models of glioma. Currently, she has established a humanized microbiome mouse model, in which human fecal samples are transplanted into gnotobiotic (germ-free) mice to successfully colonize the mouse GI tract with human microbes. This model is critical because it allows the study of the relationship between the human microbiome among different human samples (and potential GBM patients), and the responsiveness to therapies in a mouse model used for GBM studies. These studies will determine how various human gut microbiota profiles can influence tumor growth and responsiveness to therapy.



Soumya J. Niranjan B Pharm, MS, PhD

Soumya Niranjan is an Assistant Professor of Health Professions in the Department of Health Services Administration at the University of Alabama at Birmingham (UAB). She completed her undergraduate degree in Pharmacy at the Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences (India) and doctoral degree in Medical Sociology from UAB. She has also completed

a Master's of Science in Clinical Investigation Sciences from University of Louisville, Kentucky. Dr. Niranjan's research interests are in health inequalities in cancer care and outcomes. She is particularly interested in understanding key contributory factors for these disparities and shaping policies that improve patient health outcomes in medically underserved communities.



Sushanth Reddy, MD

Sushanth Reddy, MD is Associate Professor of Surgery in the Division of Surgical Oncology. He also serves as Associate Director of the Division of Surgical Oncology, Surgical Head of the UAB Pancreatobiliary Disease Center, and Alabama State Cancer Chair for the American College of Surgeons. He is an active clinician and researcher. He treats patients with

GI cancers and benign conditions focusing mainly on liver, bile duct, and pancreatic diseases. His clinical research centers around disparities and access to care for cancer patients. His basic science research involves studying molecular mechanisms in the pathogenesis of neuroendocrine cancers. He has received intra- and extra-mural grant funding for his work.



He has 18 years of public health experience on the national, state and local levels. His work has focused on disease prevention in the

areas of HIV, diabetes, cancer, and tobacco use prevention. Prior to his position at The Center, he served as a Health Education Specialist at both the Durham County Department of Public Health and Duke University Medical Center. Mr. Scott holds a BS degree in Health Education from North Carolina Central University and is a Certified Health Education Specialist.



Barry Sleckman, MD, PhD

Barry Sleckman completed his M.D. and a Ph.D. in immunology at Harvard Medical School, followed by a residency in internal medicine and a fellowship in infectious diseases at Brigham and Women's Hospital. After completing his post-doctoral training in molecular immunology in the laboratory of Dr. Frederick Alt at Boston Children's Hospital, Sleckman started his own laboratory in 1998 as an Assistant Professor in the Department of Pathology and Immunology at the Washington University School of Medicine and moved to Weill Cornell

in 2015. Dr. Sleckman held numerous leadership positions at Washington University including Chief of the Division of Laboratory and Genomic Medicine, Director of the Graduate program in Immunology and Associate Director for Basic Science at the Siteman Cancer Center. At Weill Cornell Medicine, he was Vice Chair for Experimental Pathology and Co-Chair of the Weill Cornell – Memorial Sloan Kettering Immunology Program. In 2020, Sleckman relocated his laboratory to UAB, where he now serves as the Director of the O'Neal Comprehensive Cancer Center. Dr. Sleckman's laboratory has focused on elucidating the molecular pathways required for normal lymphocyte development and on understanding how DNA repair and DNA damage response pathways regulate lymphocyte development and function, preserve genome stability and prevent lymphocyte transformation. His laboratory was the first to show that DNA damage responses provide signals that regulate cell-type specific processes that are not required for DNA repair. In addition, his lab discovered DNA damage response pathways that do not function in normal DNA repair. Rather, they function to prevent unrepaired DSBs from being aberrantly repaired as potentially dangerous chromosomal translocations and deletions. Sleckman has been elected to the American Society of Clinical Investigation and the Association of American Physicians, and he is a fellow in the American Academy for the Advancement of Science.



Sunil Sudarshan, MD

I am a urologic surgeon-scientist dedicated to further understanding of the molecular basis of renal cancer and to translate these findings to treatments that may impact the care of affected patients. I provide urological care for patients with kidney cancer. Our work on kidney cancer has led to lead/corresponding authorship in several-well

respected journals including Molecular and Cellular Biology, PLoS One, Oncogene, Oncotarget, Journal of Biological Chemistry, Clinical Cancer Research, Molecular Cancer Research, and Cancer Discovery. Our laboratory's principal focus has been to study the metabolic alterations of this malignancy, both in rare hereditary forms of RCC as well as in sporadic kidney cancer. We are interested in hereditary forms of renal cancer, as we believe the study of these disease variants can provide insight into more common, sporadic forms of this disease. Our studies also examine alterations in kidney cancer metabolism in sporadic tumors at the transcriptional, protein, and metabolite levels. In particular, our focus is to determine the cellular events that mediate these changes and their effects on tumor metabolic and epigenetic remodeling. In turn, we are interested in how this remodeling contributes to tumor formation, progression, as well as response to therapy. The overarching goal is to perform mechanistic studies that will advance our current knowledge base of aggressive kidney cancer in order to develop better methods to treat patients with advanced disease through epigenetic, metabolic, and/or signaling approaches.



Meghan Tipre, DrPh, MSPH, BDS

Meghan Tipre, DrPH, is a Research Scientist in the Division of Preventive Medicine and the Office of Community Outreach & Engagement at the O'Neal Comprehensive Cancer Center where she leads the efforts on evaluation and cancer health needs assessment. She is also the methods expert and provides statistical and data

management support for several ongoing research projects at OCOE.





Le'Andrea A. Tolbert, is a Coordinator of Clinical Research working with breast surgical oncologist Dr. Rachel B Lancaster in the UAB Division of Breast & Endocrine Surgery. She is responsible for coordinating the recruitment and retention for Alabama women in The WISDOM Study (Women Informed to Screen Depending On Measures of risk), a national

clinical trial that is evaluating the safety, efficacy and acceptance of a personalized screening strategy for mammograms. She is a native of Birmingham, Alabama & a graduate of Tuskegee University and has been actively involved in Cancer research & public health for years prior to assuming this position.
